Digitizing of the WHS Collection Continues

Our ongoing preservation project of organizing, classifying, and digitizing the Wilmot Historical Society's entire historical collection is well under way. The new software, computer, printer, and scanner, purchased with funds from a town warrant, are housed in the History Room at the town offices and have been put to good use by Mary Fanelli and Judy Hauck, who head the team for inputting digital information and photos of the collection. To date, most of the postcard collection has been scanned, and the public will soon be able to access them on line. Financial support for this endeavor comes from The Curiosity Shop. Under the guidance of Lindy Heim, this project has become an effective fundraiser as well as an outlet for de-accessioning duplicates or non-Wilmot related items in our collection. It has also proved to be a great outreach program at the Wilmot Farmers Market during the summer months.

Boston Post Cane

In 1909 as a promotional campaign the Boston Post newspaper sent an engraved walking cane to all the larger towns in New England to be held, in turn, by the oldest man in the town. WHS member Liz Kirby revived the tradition this year by initiating a policy to honor the oldest living member of the community. This year **Tony Caruso**, by virtue of his 95 years was the recipient. While the cane resides in the history room in the town offices, a photo of Tony holding the cane, and a certificate stating that he was the oldest living person in Wilmot at the time, was given to him in September. Sadly, Tony passed away on January 7, 2013.

Town Hall Stage Curtains Restored

The WHS recently collaborated with The New Hampshire State Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts to secure a Moose Grant to refurbish the stage curtains in the town hall. *Curtains Without Borders,* a company that specializes in this work, repaired and refurbished both curtains. They also refitted the rigging on which to hang them. One of the newly restored curtains that was heavily damaged and has not been displayed in several years, will be on view during Town Meeting in March 2013. Later in 2013, the WHS will present a program on the history of the curtains and the repair process.
