Liz Kirby Takes the Helm



With much enthusiasm and support, Elizabeth (Liz) Kirby of Wilmot was elected president of the Wilmot Historical Society on Sunday, October 29, at the Society's annual meeting in the historic Wilmot Town Hall in Wilmot Center.

Bringing much personal interest and experience to her new position, Kirby is well-qualified for her job. She has deep roots in Wilmot, being the fifth generation living on property that has been in her family since the 1800s

Her paternal ancestors were dairy and sheep farmers and businessmen. All held town offices and many were representatives to the state legislature, including her great grandmother. Her mother taught in one-room schools in both Wilmot and Danbury and her father was very active in Wilmot community affairs.

New Boston Post Cane Holder

Born on June 27, 1923 in Boston, MA, Ann Winifred Davenport accepted the Boston Post Cane as Wilmot's oldest resident at a small ceremony at her home in North Wilmot on March 31, 2017. Joining her for this honor were daughters Debbie Bartzak (below) and Sandy Hurst with husband George, plus some nearby friends and neighbors.



Ann attended grammar school in Alston, MA and went on to Girls High School in Brookline, MA. She married Franklin Davenport in March 1948 in New Hampshire

The couple made their home in Massachusetts for many years and spent weekends with their five children and assorted animals in the North Wilmot house lending a hand to his parents. When retirement time came in the mid 1980s, they returned to the family home in Wilmot to enjoy country living.

2017 Programs

February – Steve Gasiorowski of the 12th NH Regiment Serenade Band (left) told us about Civil War band music and instruments that provided entertainment for the troops, played for the wounded in hospitals, serenaded the officers at night, and participated in military functions. May - Jo Radner, (right) the quintessential New England storyteller, presented the program "Yankee Ingenuity: Stories of headstrong and resourceful people" to the delight of a large audience. She invited the audience to share their own stories.



October – Following the annual business meeting, our own history buff, Fred Ogmundson, (left) presented "A 1976 Bicentennial Retrospective." Fred reconstructed the impressive chain of activities organized by the Wilmot Bicentennial Committee of 1975-76 that lead up to the celebration itself. An important outcome of this Committee was the establishing of the Wilmot Historical Society as a non-profit organization in 1976.

Latest Projects

In 2017, the WHS video team continued its efforts to preserve stories of Wilmot's past. Clayton Nowell, long-time resident, spoke about farming, his life, and his interests.

An inveterate skier, dry stone wall builder, and skilled farmer, Clayton has been a careful custodian of his land in North Wilmot for decades.
